




### First Prize

ALEXANDR POROSHKIN, TOMSK STATE UNIVERSITY OF ARCHITECTURE & BUILDING, RUSSIAN FEDERATION. The project proposes a housing complex for orphans and older persons as well as a social center. A central car road and a pedestrian road connects the zones, which serve to integrate the people in this community and those outside.




### > Second Prize (tie)

It provides a working environment for older persons, connected to a road leading to the downtown area, business districts, and international airport.




### Second Prize


# > Group First Prize

# URBAN GROWTH IF NOT PROPERLY GUIDED CAN DESTROY COMMUNITIES

### **Competition Themes**

The following themes ran like a thread throughout, underscoring common concerns among people in both developing and developed countries.

**FACILITATE** intergenerational sharing within traditional family groups by helping older persons share their nurturing and wisdom with children in community and day care centers.

**CREATE** ways to help older persons retain their dignity and participate in even modest, but gainful employment.

**TRANSFORM** empty space into community parks, gardens and other inviting central open spaces, enhance physical and social connectivity, and help integrate "neglected" older persons, and orphans, into the society at large.

**PRESERVE** historic and traditional architecture in the context of religious traditions and traditional cultural lifestyles.

UTILIZE opportunities to expand work, education, health care and other personal growth/"sharing" experiences via new pathways opening up along the information communication technologies "digital highway."

INCORPORATE other diverse "connectors"—roads, pedestrian and car "corridors" to enhance social interaction; gardens, "digital park" environments and roof gardens to bring people in closer contact with nature, "co-housing" and educational learning centers — to help create a richer, more satisfying quality of life.

### Background

The Competition was established in 1994 by the International Council for Caring Communities (ICCC) in conjunction with the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-HABITAT), United Nations Focal Point on Ageing, Department of Economic and Social Affairs, the private sector and endorsed by the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture. ICCC acts as a bridge between research and practice. Since 1994 over 5,500 students from schools of architecture and design in 50 countries have participated in ICCC's "Integrated Communities: A Society for All Ages" Competitions. Its unique jury composed of architects and gerontologists

has selected winners from over 25 countries. Exhibitions have been held at United Nations HQ, China, Chile, Hungary, Spain and Thailand.
